I am Distinguished Professor in Public Health and Medical Anthropology in the School of Public Health, The University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa (2014-). From 2004-2013, I was honorary professor and, in 2008, Hillel Friedland Senior Fellow at the university. From 2014-2019 I was also Visiting Distinguished Professor in Environmental Studies in the Institute at Brown for Environment and Society, Brown University, Providence, RI, USA. In January 2020, I was made a member of the Order of Australia (AM) for significant service to education, particularly medical anthropology, and to public health. In 2016, I was awarded the Society of Medical Anthropology Career Achievement Award, honoring individuals who have advanced the field of medical anthropology through career-long contributions to theory or method, and communicate the relevance of medical anthropology to broader publics. I was the recipient of the 2023 Bronislaw Malinowski Award by the Society for Applied Anthropology, which honors an outstanding social scientist in recognition of efforts to understand and serve the needs of the world's societies, and was awarded a doctor honoris causa from Uppsala University.

I was appointed to my first tenured full professorship in 1987, at age 36, and held the position, as Professor of Tropical Health, University of Queensland, Australia, from 1988-1998. I was Professor of Women's Health, University of Melbourne, 1999-2005, and from 2006-2013, Professor of Medical Anthropology, School of Psychology and Psychiatry, Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences at Monash University. I was awarded an inaugural Australian Research Council Federation Fellowship in 2001 and held this at Melbourne and Monash from 2002-2007. I am adjunct professor at Monash University and collaborate with colleagues at Monash and the University of Melbourne.

My anthropological, social history, and public health research focuses on inequality and social exclusion, social aspects of infections and chronic disease, gender and sexuality, immigration and ethnicity in Australia, Southeast and East Asia (Malaysia, China, Thailand, the Philippines and Japan) the Solomon Islands, South Africa and Ghana. My applied work with Indigenous and immigrants Australians, and on infectious disease, includes developing guidelines for practice to enhance access to services and provide cultural appropriate services. At University of the Witwatersrand, I lead a program of work around medical and health interventions, access and equity. At Brown University, I ran a five-year interdisciplinary program, *Earth, Itself*, bringing together the arts and sciences on environmental change and sustainability. From 2015-2019, I also taught on biodiversity loss, climate change and innovation in the IE/Brown Executive MBA.

I am author, editor or co-author of 29 books and over 700 articles, book chapters and reports, including *Sickness and the State* (1996), *Surface Tensions* (2011), and I edited and cowrote (with E.Cartwright and A.Hardon) the *Routledge Handbook of Medical Anthropology* (2016). Recent works include *Connected Lives* (2020, with N. Mkhwanazi), *Viral Loads: Anthropologies of Urgency in the time of Covid-19* (with N.J.Burke and A.Wahlberg, 2021) and works of creative non-fiction and works of creative non-fiction *Water's Edge* (2022, with F.Gander) and *Imperfect Memories* (2023), I was elected Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia in 1995; Fellow, World Academy of Art and Science 2004; and member, Academy of Science of South Africa, 2016. I hold an A1 rating with the National Research Foundation of South Africa as a leading international researcher.

I have trained to graduation over 170 higher degree students and mentored dozens more. I was awarded the American Anthropological Association, Medical Anthropology Students' Association Mentor Award in 2007, and the Vice Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Postgraduate Supervision at Monash U in 2013. I was President of the International Association for the Study of Sexuality, Culture and Society (IASSCS 2001-2003). I chaired the Program Committee and was on the Board of Trustees of the World Academy of Art and Science 2010-2011, and a member of the steering committee for an Australian Academy of Science project on population and sustainability. I have been on numerous advisory groups and scientific consultations with TDR (Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases), other WHO and other multilateral agency committees since 1988, and chaired the External Review Group of the Social Innovations in Health Initiative of TDR (2015-2023). I am a member of the DNDI Access Committee (Drugs for Neglected Diseases initiative). I was an elected member of the Board of Directors of the Society for Applied Anthropology (SfAA) 2020-2023. I edited the journal *Medical Anthropology* 2010-2020. I currently edit the series *Medical Anthropology* for Rutgers University Press (2016-), and the journal *Human Organization* (2023).

I have been involved in SIHI as the initiative unfolded, and participated in the first workshop at Fondation Mérieux, Annecy, 2-4 December 2015. Since then, I have chaired (and continue to chair) the research advisory group, I was lead editor of a special issue on social innovation in health with the *Infectious Diseases of Poverty*, and I have played an active role supporting researchers in the SIHI hubs.

WHO KOBE CENTRE

I worked with WHO Kobe Centre to develop its program on women's health and leadership. I was keynote speaker at the 2nd international conference on women's health and leadership (Canberra, April 2001) and chaired plenary and committee sessions at the 3rd Conference (Kobe, April 2002). From 2002-2003 I convened the 2nd Taskforce undertaking work under the 2002 Plan of Action, supervised research and report writing relevant to this task, convened co-ordination meetings of the work of the three taskforces, and participated in the preparatory work for the 4th conference (Dar es Salaam, April 2003). I was chief investigator of a project funded by WHO/Kobe to develop checklists and guidelines to enhance women's empowerment and leadership in health. I was an active member of the Scientific Working Group of and reviewer for the Centre from 2017-2021.

INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY BUILDING

I worked closely with the Research Institute of Tropical Medicine (Manila, The Philippines) and the Faculties of Nursing and Public Health, Khon Kaen University (Thailand) from 1988-1998. I continue to work with Khon Kaen University (Thailand) providing support to the Faculty of Nursing for its PhD program, co-supervising and mentoring Thai doctoral students and their PhD supervisors. my Australian colleagues and I worked closely as collaborative researchers with Department of Allied Health Sciences, University of Malaya, The Faculty of Nursing, Khon Kaen University, the Faculty of Medicine, National University of Laos, and University of Medicine (1) Myanmar.

Through appointment as Honorary Professor, University of the Witwatersrand, 2004-2013, and particularly as Hillel Friedland Senior Fellow in the School of Public Health in 2008, I worked with colleagues to develop a doctoral training program, supervised PhD students, and provided mentorship to colleagues. I joined Wits in 2014, as Professor of Public Health and Medical Anthropology, to more effectively support the university in building capacity in the region. I supervise PhD and masters' students and Postdoctoral Fellows, teaching Medical Anthropology in the Department of Anthropology, and direct a career development program in the School of Public Health designed to mentor and support early career researchers at the university. I also provide support and training for supervisors of higher degree research students.

Consortium for Advanced Research Training in Africa (CARTA)

With Wits colleagues, I was a named applicant on the Consortium for Advanced Research Training in Africa (CARTA). CARTA is an African-led and implemented program of nine academic and four research institutions across Africa, providing a collaborative doctoral training program in population and public health, supplemented by activities to strengthen research infrastructure and capacity. Training reflects the

variety of disciplines essential to enhancing health, wellbeing and livelihoods in Africa, and necessary to build and sustain multidisciplinary research capacity in public and population health. I am involved in CARTA, through training students in workshops, supervision, and training PhD supervisors from consortium member institutions. I led curriculum development for Joint Advanced Seminar I in 2009 and 2010; I led Monash's involvement as a northern partner from 2009-2013. As a member of faculty now at Wits, I have been actively involved in CARTA through participating in advanced (residential) seminars, supervision of students, and supervisor training.

RESEARCH EXPERIENCE

As summarized below and set out in my list of publications (Annex 1) I have published extensively. My Google Scholar metrics (22 November 2023) are: Citations 17571 (total); 6724 (2018+); h-index 68 (39 for 2018+); i-10 index 336 (178 for 2018+). My RG h index is 51; Scopus 40; Web of Science 36. My research focus in anthropology, history, sociology and public health is set out below.

Political and historical research, Malaysia. Research in Malaysia and Singapore (1974, 1976-7, 1978-9, 1981, 1982, 1986) related to my doctoral work on women and politics (1974-1977) food, nutrition, and reproduction (1978+) and contemporary and historical aspects of health services and health status (1981+). Archival research in the UK (1982, 1983, 1984, 1992) related to this latter interest. My book *Sickness and the State. Health and illness in Colonial Malaya, 1870-1940* (1996) derived from this work and integrated social and material history, historical epidemiology, and demography in an account of disease and changing health status in the Straits Settlements and Malay States of British Malaya.

Sexuality, gender and women's health. I have convened several meetings internationally on gender and sexuality (including UCLA, 1990; American University, 1995; AAA double session, 1995) as well as nationally. I was a member of the WHO/TDR Taskforce on Gender. I am a founding member of the International Association for the Study of Sexuality, Culture and Society (IASSCS, from 1997) and President, 2001-2003; and convened the biennial conference of the society in Melbourne in 2001. I collaborated with the Global Forum for Health Research to hold an international meeting on gender and sexual violence, leading to the establishment of the Sexual Violence Research Initiative (www.svri.org).

I have worked on reproductive and sexual health, gender and sexuality from 1974 to present, with work conducted in Australia with immigrant, Indigenous, and other Australian-born women. Australian-based studies in recent years have included research on reproductive health with women from Sahel Africa and Middle East; the impact of day surgery on women from new communities; understandings of gynecological cancer diagnosis and treatment among women from diverse backgrounds; and lay understandings, diagnosis and management of chronic gynaecological ailments. My work in this area continued with an ARC Linkage grant with a network of non-government organisations, on access to contraceptive technologies among immigrant and refugee women. I have published and edited several collections in the areas of sexuality and public health policy, HIV/AIDS, and sex and gender in Asia and the Pacific. I continue to publish in this field and to supervise doctoral students in the areas of sexual and reproductive health, HIV/AIDS, and sexuality in South Africa.

Australian and immigrant studies. Research in Australia (1979+) includes collaborative studies with the Vietnamese community on infant feeding; the Turkish community on women's work, reproduction and production (1980-83) and education and occupational mobility (1989-90); and with Australian-born women on pregnancy and mothering (1982- 1987). From 1995 to 1999 I was a co-investigator of the Australian Longitudinal Study on Women's Health, funded as a collaboration of the University of Newcastle and the University of Queensland. The UQ component focused on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island women and immigrant women (Filipinas and women from Bosnia and Herzegovina). Other work included studies on barriers to and appropriate delivery systems for breast and cervical cancer screening and breast cancer diagnosis and treatment among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island women (endorsed by state government and recommendations provided basis of strategic plan); the effects of ethnicity and culture on cervical screening; developing a manual for mental health needs assessments for non-English speaking background communities; developing ethnic community profiles for health providers to improve quality of care; developing guidelines for the care of in-patients from diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds; checklists for cultural assessments in clinical settings; and training workshops for Indigenous health workers in women's business. I have worked

on diabetes and depression, complementary and alternative medicine, and social impact of amputation including with immigrants, since 2003. From 2008-2010, I led a study on parenting, transnationalism and social capital among Iraqi and Cambodian communities, and am a partner investigator on contraceptive technologies (see above). Other Australian research is set out below (Chronic Disease and Disability).

Nutritional anthropology. In 1978-79 I conducted research in Peninsular Malaysia on traditional medical theory and dietary practice; and in 1980-1982 on breastfeeding and changing infant feeding practices. In Australia, in 1979-1980, I worked collaboratively on Vietnamese medical theories and dietary practices. I was involved in research in Japan (1988-1990) in a whaling village in northeast Honshu, which assessed the social and cultural impact of the cessation of coastal whaling. A number of doctoral students have worked in topics related to infant feeding and nutrition.

Infectious disease. From 1988, I worked closely with WHO/TDR and other agencies on neglected tropical diseases, and consequently worked in collaboration with Chinese colleagues in Shanghai, Haikou, Beijing and Jiangsu, participating in training workshops, supervising doctoral students, supporting research and co-publishing on schistosomiasis and malaria. With colleagues from the Health Research Unit, Ministry of Health, Ghana, I undertook field research in Ghana in 1992 for the development of the Malaria Manual; and supervised the field tests and evaluation of the manual in Ghana, Uganda, Cameroon, and China (1992-1994). I undertook research on malaria in collaboration with Research Institute of Tropical Medicine, 1994-1999, to develop and evaluate community-based methods for controlling malaria. The project, conducted in Morong, Bataan and Tayabas, Quezon Province, aimed to increase early case detection and treatment, to develop training and improve IEC delivery to support the volunteer program, and to develop health education for delivery by volunteers. Research in Agusan del Sur, Mindanao, the Philippines (1995-2000) emphasised prompt diagnosis and treatment of malaria; I oversaw the rapid assessments to develop baseline data and to design a comprehensive multimedia IEC strategy. With doctoral students, I have worked on schistosomiasis, dengue fever, malaria, and tuberculosis. Through my present links with U Wits and UCT, with TDR, I am contributing to research and interventions in the field of social innovation for health to enhance the effective delivery of health care and sustain primary health care programs.

Chronic Disease and Disability. For the past 20 years, I have focused on chronic conditions, including comorbidity, disability and chronicity, to contribute substantially to understanding how, in different cultural, social and economic settings and under different, more immediate circumstances, embodied experience, ideas of the self, and social relationships and their meanings, are revised and restructured as a result of changed health status, impairment, and marked corporeal change. I have undertaken collaborative research in urban and rural settings in Australia, Thailand, Malaysia, Myanmar and Lao People's Democratic Republic, Solomon Islands and South Africa, and supervised graduate students also in India and Indonesia, on cultural models and community understandings of disability; access to care and adherence to medical advice; complementary and alternative medicine and practitioners; patterns of care and social integration of people with disability; and social support, social networks and family care giving, among other areas. My current interest is firstly, on the cultural logics of 'treat to prevent', which addresses the use of monitoring and intervention technologies, access to care and the management of risk. Secondly, I am conducting research on social changes, household structure and caregiving in South Africa.

Climate Change and the Environment. I am increasingly supervising students and publishing in the field of climate change, health, environment and biodiversity. I was a member of the steering committee for an ARC project of the Australian Academy of Science on population, equity, climate change and sustainability, result in a three-volume publication on this topic. At Brown University, as curator and producer of Earth, Itself, I focused on these questions, and brought together the creative arts, humanities, and social, biological and physical sciences in a range of activities designed to enhance interdisciplinary conversations. This work extended to the University of the Witwatersrand in 2018. I also taught a course on biodiversity, climate change and innovation (Natural Collections: Responses to Biodiversity, Industrialization and Change) in the IE Brown Executive MBA, 2015-2019. My current research grant (with E.Moyer, UvA, South Africa Merian Fund) focuses on the water, energy and food (WEF) nexus in urban and periurban settings in South Africa.

The second event held 28-30 April 2016 – *Atmospheres: Science, art and the air that sustains us* – brought together sound ecologists, social and biological scientists, policy makers and artists in a program that included site specific and mobile sound installations, performance, posters and flash lectures, film festival, keynote lectures, seminars, and concert on the theme. *What Fire Does* (19-28 April 2017) was an interdisciplinary exploration of the productive, creative, destructive, and transformative powers of fire, and included a two-week program, with the variety of previous years, with fire arts installations and performance. *Water's Edge* (3-13 April 2018) included an extensive academic program, poetry and performance. This was followed by an art/science program at the University of the Witwatersrand, South Africa, 10-21 September 2018, entitled *Watershed: Art, science and elemental politics*, involving South African, Peruvian, Indian and US artists and academics across the faculties at Wits and beyond (<https://www.wits.ac.za/news/latest-news/our-people/2018/2018-09/medical-anthropologist-provokes-new-thinking-about-water.html>).
